### PRE-REGISTRATION

#### **EARLY BIRD**

Pre-registration is available online only at <a href="https://bje 2017 ece institute.eventbrite.com">https://bje 2017 ece institute.eventbrite.com</a> and must be paid in full by February 10, 2017, in order to qualify for the BJE affiliated school early bird registration fee of \$50.00 per person. BJE affiliated schools registering 11-20 individuals qualify for reduced early bird fees of \$45 per person. BJE affiliated schools registering 21 or more may pay an early bird fee of \$40 per person. Please note that these reduced fees are only available until February 10, 2017.

#### WALK-IN

Registrations received or postmarked **after February 10, 2017** will not be processed, and will be considered as **walk-in registration**. Walk-in registrants from BJE affiliated schools must pay **\$100.00** at the **door**, and workshops will be assigned the morning of the conference.

### **NON BJE-AFFILIATED SCHOOLS**

All registrations from schools and guests not affiliated with BJE received or postmarked by February 10, 2017, must be accompanied by a registration fee of \$75.00 per person. Those received after this deadline will be considered walk-ins and non-affiliated walk-ins must pay \$125 at the door.

### Addressing Challenging Behaviors in the ECE Classroom

Appropriate for all ages

We will present a method of examining the causes of common challenging behaviors found in ECE classrooms and provide strategies for helping the ECE professional cope with them. We start with examining ourselves as educators interested in how children's behaviors affect us in our classrooms. We progress to examining the physical/social/emotional environment that we have control over in our settings to determine how it might affect children's behavior. Then we seek to understand what the child is communicating to us through the challenging behavior. Finally, we will discuss and offer strategies that a teacher can immediately implement to help children learn appropriate behaviors while supporting their growth and development.

### **PRESENTERS**

Jayanti Tambe is the Executive Director of Early Learning at UCLA. She is the author of the books, "The Art of Math and Science" and "A Kaleidoscope of Children: How to Awaken Young Minds and Inspire Childhood Curiosity and Creativity." She has served as the Executive Director of Pacific Oaks Children's School. Jayanti also served as a core faculty member in the School of Education at Pacific Oaks College. Prior to moving to Southern California, Jayanti served as the Director of the Rainbow School and Pepper Tree School at Stanford University. She teaches courses on Child, Family, Community, Music & Movement, Supporting Dual Language Learners in a Multilingual Classroom, Health & Safety, Administration in Early Childhood Education, Business and Fiscal Management, and HR Administration in Educational Leadership, among others. She created and designed the Early Childhood Trauma Specialization for Pacific Oaks College. She also serves as a Peer Reviewer for NAEYC's Early Childhood Associate Degree Accreditation (ECADA). Through her appointment by several national associations, institutes and universities, she has been widely accredited for her innovation in teaching practices. She has presented at conferences around the world on a myriad of child development topics that include: Leadership in Early Education; Science and Math in Early Childhood; Supporting Bilingual Children; Gender Identity in Early Childhood; Managing Stress in Early Childhood; and Risk Taking in Early Childhood.

Linda Barker, M.A., has a Masters Degree in Marriage, Child and Family Counseling and a Pupil Personnel Credential. She has been with the Frostig Center since 1997 as the Early Childhood Education Specialist in the C&E Department. Linda has extensive experience in teaching Early Childhood Education and Parent Education programs. She currently provides consultation and professional development services at various ECE settings in the L.A. area. She has been a presenter at the CA Association for the Education of Young Children (CAEYC), the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) and the CA Association of Private Schools (CAPSO) conferences. She has provided counseling services in mental health settings and elementary schools.

Roberta Goldberg, Ph.D., received her Doctorate in Developmental Psychology and School Psychology from the University of Minnesota. At the Frostig Center, she has served as Clinical Director and, since 1989, as the Director of the C&E Department. Dr. Goldberg speaks frequently to audiences concerning children's learning and behavior, including conferences for the following organizations: the Learning Disabilities of America (LDA), CA Association for the Education of Young Children (CAEYC), CA Association of School Administrators, LA Archdiocese (Inclusion), Council for Exceptional Children and World Forum. Dr. Goldberg publishes regularly in the area of longitudinal studies of children with learning disabilities.

**Karen Golden** began telling stories at her dinner table at the age of three and playing her saxophone at age 9. Now her table has grown to include the world! She recently returned from her first Asia tour to China, Hong Kong and S. Korea, where she told stories and taught the art of storytelling at schools to students learning English as a second language. When she is stateside, she can be found teaching teachers how to use storytelling in the classroom and performing at a variety of schools, synagogues, libraries, museums, universities and other gatherings of humans. Karen is also the founder and director of Creative Learning Place, a learning center for homeschooled students in Los Angeles.

### **PRESENTERS**

Rabbi Sarah Hronsky joined Temple Beth Hillel in July 2003 following her ordination at Hebrew Union College—Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC) of Los Angeles. While at HUC, she earned two masters degrees: one in Hebrew Letters and the other in Jewish Communal Service. She works extensively with the Board and staff of Temple Beth Hillel to ensure a thriving Reform Jewish community in the East San Fernando Valley. She brings energy and creativity to the vast programming of the congregation. Her rabbinate is filled with teaching, counseling, liturgical exploration, and leadership. She enthusiastically sings with the children and assists in the development of the Beth Hillel's successful preschool and parent and me programs, teaches and leads prayer in her temple's Religious School and Elementary Day School, and provides enriching instruction throughout its Adult Education Program. Rabbi Sarah is most honored to work directly with families in the congregation through their joyous moments and their most difficult times. In addition, Rabbi Sarah has served on the Board of the Board of Rabbis of California for 9 years. She currently serves as Vice President. She is proud to be a fellow in the Shalom Hartman Rabbinic Leadership Cohort, where she studies with rabbis of all denominational backgrounds in an intensive manner throughout the year. She is in the first year of this three year program.

Kathy Leader grew up in South Africa where she received a Masters in Fine Art at the Michaelis School of Art, University of Cape Town. She then went on to get her Masters in Art Education. After teaching at a Jewish high school in Cape Town, Kathy emigrated to the United States in 1985. After moving to Los Angeles, Kathy taught in various school settings. She soon realized that she had a particular style of teaching based on her observation of what determines creative self confidence in the classroom. With this philosophy, she opened her own art studio called "The Art Process". Currently Kathy teaches private art lessons and workshops to children and adults out of her art studio and at the American Jewish University. Her style of teaching reflects her own creative journey allowing the process to become a personal voyage of internal discovery. Kathy also trains early childhood teachers in "the art process" method of teaching.

Amanda Brault Miller received her undergraduate degree from the University of California at San Diego in Linguistics, with Specialization in Sociolinguistics, in 1997. She was accepted to the master's program in Speech Language Pathology at California State University, Northridge, and graduated with honors in 2000. She was invited to begin teaching at her alma mater, CSUN, the following year, and has been enjoying her role as part time lecturer and clinical supervisor ever since. She is a clinician at heart, and has devoted her private practice to pediatric clients who present with articulation and phonological disorders, auditory processing disorders, expressive language disorders, and social cognitive disorders. Her most recent passion project has been the development of small, customized "Social Thinking" groups that teach children how to "share space" more effectively by modeling concepts and teaching vocabulary developed by Michelle Garcia Winner (www.socialthinking.com).

### **PRESENTERS**

**Kira Rappaport** is in her 13th year as the music specialist at Pressman Academy, where she teaches "Parent & Me" Music, nine preschool classes and Kindergarten through Grade 3. She holds an M.A. in Music Education from CSULA and a B.M. in Flute Performance from USC. In addition, she has completed all three levels of Orff Schulwerk teacher training, Dalcroze Eurhythmics teacher training and Mastership Certification in Edwin Gordon's Early Childhood Music Learning Theory. Kira regularly presents workshops to classroom teachers on the use of music in the classroom, including presentations at CAEYC in 2008, 2010, and 2014, the BEST Arts Conference in 2014 & 2015, and BJE in 2008 & 2016. Kira believes music is an invaluable tool in the early childhood classroom and is very passionate about and committed to providing classroom teachers with the tools to make music a regular part of their curriculum.

Rabbi Noam Raucher, Senior Rabbi of Pasadena Jewish Temple and Center is from Hamden, CT and grew up in a home of Jewish educators and leaders. He graduated from Hofstra University in 2002 with honors in Judaic Studies and Psychology. Noam spent the next few years working for Hillel at the University of California, San Diego; and as a counselor at the Yale Psychiatric Hospital in New Haven, CT. Eventually he made the move back out to California to attend the Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies, and was ordained in 2011. Following ordination, Rabbi Raucher served as Associate Rabbi of Temple Israel in Charlotte, North Carolina. In that role Rabbi Raucher assumed responsibility for any and all pulpit tasks, overseeing youth programming and activities, young professional leadership, young family engagement, adult education, and outreach to marginalized members of the Jewish community. Rabbi Raucher loves being a rabbi and the meaningful work of the rabbinate. His self-written professional credo states: "I will live each and every day guided by a covenant of love with my Teacher. Each day I give thanks for the opportunity to serve the Jewish people, my fellow citizens of the world, and G-d. In service to them I will operate as a light of the Jewish tradition perpetuating: love, justice, hope, and wisdom. I will value people over programs and relationships over numbers. I will always strive to sanctify life and treat all of creation as holy."

Heidi Soussan, MS, OTR/L, has been practicing in pediatrics since 1998. Her practice has included hospital settings, private clinics, in-home therapy, and school-based practice. She was a lead Occupational Therapist for SMMUSD's integrated pre-school classrooms and oversaw OT services at multiple sites. Now running her own private pediatric practice, Heidi Soussan Pediatric Therapy and Associates, in Sherman Oaks, CA, she focuses on child-centered, play-based techniques that support the whole-child and the family unit. Heidi's approach is inclusive to all aspects of the child's life, creating specific pathways of growth for each family she works with. She is passionate about fostering the best success for each child, guiding families with all of the resources, strategies and opportunities that are within the community. Heidi Soussan received her bachelor's degree in Psychology from the University of South Florida in Tampa, and her Masters of Science degree from Florida International University in Miami. She has training and certifications in several pediatric-specific areas such as Hand Writing Without Tears, The Therapeutic Listening Program, and Infant Massage. She has developed and presented workshops on sensory processing and other pediatric issues to schools throughout her community. Her workshops are designed to build better awareness for teachers and caregivers in order help children become successful and empowered.
